





Northern Ireland has thousands of houses built from no fines concrete No-fines is a poor material which is porous to rain and damp

The NIHE are about to embark on a programme to retrofit 659 of them across the province costing nearly £20 million.



No Fines – No Fun?

The contract to retrofit 659 no fines houses has been awarded to a consortium of Northern Irish building and maintenance companies and a Scottish company that specialises in insulated render systems

Despite the contract been awarded the retrofit systems to be used have not yet been designed according to an NIHE FOI response
But "there are preliminary proposals for a grey expanded polystyrene Insulation system"

Timber windows will be replaced with PVC windows.





I am opposed to using plastic foam insulation external wall systems as they seal the damp inside buildings, don't allow them to breathe and are flammable and toxic causing plastic pollution

Polystyrene insulation is being removed from tower blocks



The retrofit disaster problem

49. Over the years, householders have experienced energy saving interventions, such as damp proofing and solid wall insulation, which have not delivered the benefits that were promised. This has eroded householders' confidence in such activities. Mark Harris from the Homebuilders' Federation gave the Committee an example of the historical problems:

"I was working at Bridgend council delivering Arbed schemes, and we were merrily cladding buildings and filling cavities full of insulation. Five years later, we've got companies setting up now to take cladding off and to take insulation out because we've realised that, actually, either it wasn't the right thing to do or the skill set that delivered it wasn't properly skilled and it was done in a rush."

Preston Retrofit Disaster



An external insulation contract in Preston, run under a government energy saving scheme five years ago went horribly wrong. Up to 390 homes were affected with water penetration, mould and damp.

Four years on the problems, some of them severe, have only been rectified for some of the affected households. Occupants, many elderly and on low incomes, have in some cases reportedly been forced to pay for repairs themselves.






Supporting Victims of Failed Cavity Wall Insulation





Hempcrete is embedded in the structural frame, forming a homogeneous 350mm-400mm thick external wall.

Hempcrete is fundamentally an infill material either cast or sprayed to form a continuous joint-free wall, which is rendered internally and externally with vapour permeable lime based products suitable for use with hempcrete.




